Prefix Origins 're-' (back, again)

Adding the prefix "re-" to a word can apply the meaning "again", "back", "against". Words containing this prefix often have Old French and Latin origins.



Word	Word Origin	Current Word Meaning
-- <i>call</i>	1580's from Old English/Old Norse: "ceallian"/"kalla" to call, shout out (re "again" + call "call")	
-- <i>peat</i>	1550's from Old French/Latin: "repeter"/"repetere" say, attack do again (re "apart" + petere "go forward")	
-- <i>apply</i>	1723 from Old French: "aploier" apply, use, attach (re "again" + apply "give attention to")	
-- <i>do</i>	1590's from Old English/Old Saxon: "don"/"duan" act, make, put (re "again" + do "perform")	
-- <i>gain</i>	1540's from Middle French: "regaigner" to gain back (re "again" + gagner "gain profit")
