Style: Impressionism

Renoir was a French painter who was part of the Impressionist Movement. His most famous works were colourful and full of movement - like snapshots of life.

Renoir developed rheumatoid arthritis around 1892. He continued to paint but needed to adapt his painting technique towards the end of his career when holding a brush became difficult.



Dance at Le Moulin de la Galette



This is one of Renoir's most famous paintings. He painted this outdoor scene in true impressionist style. His freely applied brush strokes create a slightly blurred atmosphere, highlighting the joy and movement of the dance.

The man with his back to the viewer seems to be talking to the woman but she has momentarily looked away. I wonder why?

The Theater Box

The characters in this painting are seated in the box in the theatre. Boxes are individual balconies along the walls of a theatre. These seats were reserved for important people who could afford to pay for the best view of the theatre.

It also gave patrons the best view of other patrons! It was fashionable to "be seen" at the theatre. I wonder who is watching who through their opera glasses on this night at the theatre!
