

# Adjectives of Quantity

Quantitative adjectives describe exact and general amounts of a noun.

They are usually placed before the noun in a sentence.

Numbers can be used for exact, countable amounts.

For example: We picked twenty apples today!



# Adjectives of Quantity

When we don't know the exact number, or if we are estimating the amount, we use general adjectives.

The most common adjectives include:

some

any

few

several

many

much



I saw several birds in the tree.

# Adjectives of Quantity



I'll have \_\_\_\_\_ sugar.

Adjectives we use for nouns that can't be individually counted:

some      bowlful      spoonful  
plenty      a little

Can you think of any more?



I had a \_\_\_\_\_ rice.



I put \_\_\_\_\_ on my bread.

# Adjectives of Quantity:

many

Use for countable nouns.

For example:

How many pets do you have?



much

Use for uncountable nouns.

For example:

How much sugar should I add?

times?
