

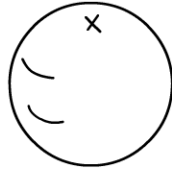

Orange foods

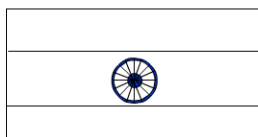
There are several orange foods such as oranges and pumpkin.
